Dear Ms. Cotca and Mr. Dunagan;

Enclosed please find the records responsive to your 19 December 2012 Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request, submitted on behalf of Judicial Watch, seeking:

- 1. Any and all guest lists or other records identifying individuals who attended and/or were invited to attend the June 24, 2011 awards ceremony at CIA Headquarters for individuals involved in the search for, and killing of, Osama bin Ladin.
- 2. Any and all records of communication between any official, employee, or representative of the Central Intelligence Agency and any other party regarding the attendance of Mr. Mark Boal at the aforementioned awards ceremony

As a result of a thorough search, CIA personnel located 73 records responsive to your request. As noted on the enclosed preliminary *Vaughn* index, two documents have been released in full, forty-seven documents in part, and thirteen documents were denied in full. Information was withheld pursuant to FOIA exemptions (b)(1), (b)(3), (b)(5), and/or (b)(6). Additionally, eleven documents, which are not enumerated on the preliminary *Vaughn* index, have been withheld in full on the basis of FOIA exemption (b)(7)(A). In addition, exemptions (b)(1), (b)(3), (b)(5), (b)(6), and/or (b)(7)(C) may be applicable to these documents. These documents consist of interview reports and requests for information in connection with an Office of Inspector General inquiry. The enclosed sheet contains explanations of the FOIA exemptions.

As reflected on the preliminary *Vaughn* Index, the relevant statutes associated with the information withheld pursuant to FOIA exemption (b)(3) are: the Section 6 of the Central Intelligence Agency Act of 1949, as amended, 50 U.S.C. § 3507 (formerly codified at 50 U.S.C. § 403g), which protects the organization, functions, names and numbers of personnel employed by the Agency; Section 102A(i)(1) of the National Security Act of 1947, as amended, 50 U.S.C. § 3024 (formerly codified at 50 U.S.C. § 403-1(i)(1)), which exempts intelligence sources and methods from unauthorized disclosure; 10 U.S.C. § 130b, which protects personally identifying information regarding personnel assigned to an overseas, sensitive or routinely deployable unit; and the National Security Agency Act of 1959, 50 U.S.C. § 3605, which protects functions and activities of the National Security Agency.

Because the above-referenced request is a subject of pending litigation in federal court, in accordance with Agency regulations as set forth at Section 1900.42 of Title 32 of the Code of Federal Regulations, you are not entitled to appeal this determination administratively.

### Defense, CIA to Investigate Access for Filmmakers to Info on Bin Laden Kill Mission

The Defense Department and CIA have agreed to investigate access to and possible release of classified information to Hollywood filmmakers on the killing of Usama bin Laden after a Republican lawmaker questioned the release of information into the May 1 raid in Pakistan.

Rep. Peter King, chairman of the House Homeland Security Committee, asked for a review in August as to whether "Hurt Locker" director Kathryn Bigelow was given access that King suggested could leave U.S. military secrets and personnel open either to leaks or worse. Bigelow and executive Mark Boal are working on a movie about the hunt for Bin Laden.

King said in a statement Thursday he was gratified that the two agencies had agreed to look into Bigelow's and Boal's access.

"Following a shockingly dismissive response to my request from White House Press Secretary Jay Carney, I am pleased that the inspectors general at DoD and the CIA agree with me that potential leaks to filmmakers are something worth investigating and taking action to address," King said.

"The leaks that followed the successful bin Laden mission led to the arrests of Pakistanis and put in danger the mission's heroes and their families," he said.

In her Dec. 23 letter to King, CIA Deputy Inspector General Patricia A. Lewis wrote that "the CIA's Office of Public Affairs handles requests for information from the entertainment industry."

"According to a senior official from that office, the protection of national security equities -- including the preservation of our ability to conduct effective counterterrorism operation -- is the decisive factor in determining how the CIA engages with filmmakers and the media as a whole," she wrote.

The office also is "developing a written policy to create a single point of reference that will govern future interactions with the entertainment industry," she added.

Citing a New York Times report, King wrote in his Aug. 9 letter that Bigelow and Boal were granted "top-level access to the most classified mission in history' to produce a move about the raid, due for release in October 2012. Reportedly, a Hollywood filmmaker also attended a CIA ceremony in honor of the team that carried out the raid."

King asked whether the White House was involved in consultations on the "advisability" of providing Hollywood executives with access to covert military operators and clandestine CIA officers; whether the Defense Department or CIA will get an advance copy of the film to review to determine if special operations

tactics or techniques were revealed and how compromised undercover agents may be by the presence of filmmakers at CIA meetings about the raid.

The White House has denied discussing classified information and in August dismissed King's concern.

"I would hope that as we face a continued threat from terrorism, the House Committee on Homeland Security would have more important topics to discuss than a movie," White House spokesman Jay Carney said on Aug. 10.

Bigelow has said the "film has been in the works for years" and chronicles, In a nonpartisan way, the efforts of the Clinton, Bush and Obama administrations to capture the Al Qaeda leader.

However, its scheduled release date has raised questions about Obama's re-election effort and his image as a terrorist-slayer.

The Defense Department decision to take up the investigation, which will involve the offices of intelligence, special operations command and public affairs, comes within days of an apparently renewed focus by the president's re-election team on Hollywood.

The Hollywood Reporter on Wednesday reported that Obama's ambassador to the Bahamas has returned to Los Angeles "in the hopes of patching up the incumbent president's battered relationship with the entertainment industry."

Nicole Avant, the daughter of Democratic activist and music executive Clarence Avant, was rewarded the diplomatic post after raising millions for the president's 2008 campaign, the Reporter said. Now, she has returned home to court Hollywood activists who say that the president "has given their causes short shrift since moving into the White House," according to The Hollywood Reporter.

First lady Michelle Obama is reportedly to be in Hollywood at the end of the month for fundraisers.

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### New York Times Reporter Gave CIA Flack a Sneak Peak at Maureen Dowd's Column

New York Times reporter Mark Mazzetti e-mailed an advance, unpublished copy of a Maureen Dowd column dealing with the CIA to an Agency spokeswoman last year, according to <u>newly released emails</u> obtained by Judicial Watch under the Freedom of Information Act. Depending on whom at the *Times* you ask, that was either "much ado about nothing" or a "mistake that is not consistent with New York Times standards."

The emails were released to Judicial Watch as part of a FOIA lawsuit the group brought seeking information about the Agency's cooperation with filmmakers Kathryn Bigelow and Mark Boal, who are working on a film about the assassination of Osama bin Laden. They show that last August, Mazzetti, who covers national security for the *Times*, sent CIA spokeswoman Marie Harf a Maureen Dowd column the paper was about to publish critiquing the White House's attempt to spin the raid with the admonition, "this didn't come from me...and please delete after you read." Earlier, Harf had emailed Mazzetti asking "any word?" Mazzetti had replied, "Going to see a version before it gets filed. My sense is there is a very brief mention at the very bottom of column about CIA ceremony, but that Boal also got high level access at the Pentagon."

Indeed, the column reported that Boal had been invited to a CIA ceremony honoring the SEALs. The exchange was obviously an effort on Harf's part to gather intelligence about what the *Times* was going to report. And if Mazzetti did indeed send Harf a version he saw "before it [got] filed," that means the CIA read Dowd's column before her own editors did. Mazzetti declined to comment for the record.

As far as *Times* managing editor Dean Baquet is concerned, this sort of cozy information-sharing (for which *Wall Street Journal* reporter and elephant-fucker Gina Chon was <u>nominally fired in June</u>) is no big deal at all. "I know the circumstances, and if you knew everything that's going on, you'd know it's much ado about nothing," <u>Baquet told Politico's Dylan Byers</u>. "I can't go into in detail. But I'm confident after talking to Mark that it's much ado about nothing. The optics aren't what they look like."

But *Times* spokeswoman Eileen Murphy, issuing a statement to Gawker on behalf of the paper, had a slightly less sanguine take.

Last August, Maureen Dowd asked Mark Mazzetti to help check a fact for her column. In the course of doing so, he sent the entire column to a CIA spokeswoman shortly before her deadline. He did this without the knowledge of Ms. Dowd. This action was a mistake that is not consistent with New York Times standards.

It's not really clear what's behind the cognitive dissonance, though the statement's insistence that Mazzetti acted without Dowd's knowledge might explain it. Perhaps she found more to be "ado" about than Baquet did with the notion of her colleague sharing a critical column with a flack for the spooks, and asked that it produced the spooks are considered to the spooks and asked that it produced the spooks are considered to the spooks.

The Judicial Watch emails, by the way—which are supplementary to another batch released in May—offer a wealth of new information on the extent to which the White House invited Boal and Bigelow into the highly classified world of the bin Laden raid, including letting them speak to a translator who joined the raid and the fact that then-CIA director Leon Panetta was fully aware of the project and offered his "full knowledge and full approval/support."

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### Unreleased: Probe Finds CIA Honcho Disclosed Top Secret Info to Hollywood

The Defense Department Inspector General's office has been sitting on a report that former Defense Secretary Leon Panetta disclosed "TOP SECRET" information and other sensitive details two years ago at an event attended by a "Hollywood executive" working on the movie Zero Dark Thirty.

In June 2011, when he was director of the Central Intelligence Agency, Panetta discussed the information at a CIA headquarters event honoring participants in the raid that killed Osama bin Laden, according to an unreleased report drafted by the Inspector General's office and obtained by the Project On Government Oversight (POGO).

"During this awards ceremony, Director Panetta specifically recognized the unit that conducted the raid and identified the ground commander by name," the draft report says. "According to the DoD Office of Security Review, the individual's name is protected from public release" under federal law, the report says.

"Director Panetta also provided DoD information, identified by relevant Original Classification Authorities as TOP SECRET//SI//REL TO USA, AUS, CAN, GBR, NZL, as well as, SECRET/ACCM," the report says.

Panetta was not interviewed for the report, the document says. POGO's repeated attempts to reach him or a spokesperson for him through the Panetta Institute for Public Policy, his base in California, were unsuccessful.

"The report is not yet completed," said Bridget Ann Serchak, a spokeswoman for the Inspector General's office. "Once it is released, if it is unclassified, it will be posted on our Listserv and in our newsletter as well as on our website."

### **Plugging Leaks**

Disclosures of classified information have taken center stage in Washington recently as the government has ratcheted up actions against leakers, whistleblowers, and journalists. The nation has been struggling to draw the line between truth-telling in the public interest and criminal violations of national security—a debate that runs through the newly opened trial of accused WikiLeaks tipster Bradley Manning, the Justice Department's pursuit of phone and email records of reporters for the Associated Press and Fox News, and the imprisonment of former CIA agent John Kiriakou for divulging the names of fellow officers.

James Comey, widely reported to be President Obama's choice to become FBI director, has set his own tough standard. "[S]ome things can't leak," Comey said in a 2007 video clip broadcast last week on the PBS NewsHour. "The flip side of that is, when they do leak, the government has to do something about it, has to, because we care about the rule of law."

The Inspector General (IG) report obtained by POGO lays out results of an investigation requested almost two years ago by the then-chairman of the House Committee on Homeland Security, Peter T. King (R-NY). In August 2011, he wrote that he was concerned that filmmakers had reportedly received "top level access to the most classified mission in history." The probe was formally initiated in December 2011.

The fact that the IG's office has not released its findings has caused consternation among the office staff, people familiar with the probe told POGO. Within the office, there was a push to make findings public as early as a year ago, sources speaking on condition of anonymity said. Last fall, the office took steps toward releasing some version of the report, including putting it through a Pentagon vetting process and preparing talking points to explain the contents, a person familiar with the investigation said.

Another person with knowledge of the probe said the draft report obtained by POGO matched a copy that person examined in January, when it appeared to be all but ready for release. The IG's office had gone so far as to include an undated cover letter addressed to the House committee chairman who requested the investigation.

### Message From a Whistleblower

Appointed by President Obama, Panetta served as CIA director from 2009 to mid-2011 and as Defense secretary from mid-2011 until early this year.

The unknown fate of the IG report was the subject of a December 2012 email exchange—obtained by POGO—between a congressional staff member and an employee in the IG's office. The congressional aide mentions having heard that someone in the IG's office was "sitting on it until Secretary Panetta retires" and asks the IG employee for any information about it.

The IG employee replies: "That effort... has been controlled and manipulated since inception by the IG Front Office." The employee adds: "There is a version ready to hit the street, been long time ready to hit the street...but we will see if that happens anytime soon. Highly unusual tight controls and tactical involvement from senior leadership on this project."

The employee says the matter reflects broader problems within the IG's office.

"I have grave concerns that the message and findings are now controlled and subject to undue influence across the board at DoD IG. I have never experienced or seen so much influence or involvement by outsiders now in developing and issuing oversight reports."

The IG employee invokes whistleblower status.

"I consider this protected communications on alleged wrong-doings within the Government."

### Lame Duck Watchdogs

The story of the unreleased investigative report illustrates systemic problems that can undermine <u>the independence of inspectors general</u>, federal watchdogs meant <u>to provide a check on executive branch</u> departments and agencies. The Defense Department IG answers not only to Congress but also to the secretary.

Across various departments, <u>IG posts have gone unfilled for long periods of time</u>, left in the hands of officials serving on an interim basis. Less secure in their jobs, they may be in a weaker position to challenge authority.

As POGO said in testimony to Congress last year, "It is hard to imagine that an Acting IG known for conducting hard-hitting investigations and audits that implicate high-level administration officials would be asked by that same administration to serve as IG on a permanent basis."

The Defense Department IG's job has been vacant since December 2011, and the office has been headed on a temporary basis by Lynne M. Halbrooks, who is now the principal deputy inspector general. She has sought support to be named permanent inspector general, a presidential appointment that traditionally involves the approval of the secretary.

Serchak, the IG spokeswoman, said the absence of a permanent inspector general has not affected the office's work.

"Nothing's changed," she said.

In January, representatives of the IG's office told Senate overseers that the Zero Dark Thirty report would not be released until the office had completed two related reports, POGO has been told.

The IG report also highlights what critics have complained is inconsistent treatment of people who spill government secrets.

"It's like Animal Farm," said one person with knowledge of the investigation. "Some people are more equal than others."

In the realm of national security, the government has taken extraordinary steps to plug news leaks, prosecute whistleblowers, and probe news organizations. In contrast, the IG report describes how the Obama Administration threw its support behind a Hollywood project depicting one of President Obama's most dramatic triumphs – the nighttime SEAL team assault on the compound in Abbottabad, Pakistan where bin Laden – referred to as "UBL" – had been hiding.

After Panetta became secretary of Defense, senior Panetta aides implored a resistant Special Operations Command to assist, according to the draft IG report.

"Secretary Panetta wants the Department to cooperate fully with the makers of the UBL movie," a Pentagon under secretary emailed the head of Special Operations, according to the report.

Emailing a senior Pentagon colleague during the summer of 2011, Defense Department spokesman George Little offered a glimpse of Panetta's enthusiasm. "I hope they get Pacino to play [Secretary Panetta]," the report quotes Little as having written. "That's what he wants, no joke!"

### Inside The CIA's Big Tent

Zero Dark Thirty debuted in December 2012. At one time, it had been slated for release before last fall's election. The producers included Kathryn Bigelow, the Academy Award winning director of The Hurt Locker, about an Army bomb squad in Iraq, and Mark Boal, screenwriter of The Hurt Locker.

The IG report recounts that Boal was permitted to attend a June 24, 2011, ceremony at CIA headquarters honoring personnel involved in the May 2011 bin Laden raid. The fact that the screenwriter was allowed to attend has been reported previously and has been a subject of controversy. The IG report provides new details about the event—notably, that Panetta's remarks contained information classified as Secret and Top Secret.

The "SI" part of the Top Secret marking refers to Special Intelligence, another term for communications intelligence, according to a Defense Department classification manual. It applies to electronic intercepts, said Steven Aftergood of the Federation of American Scientists. The rest of the Top Secret marking – "REL TO USA, AUS, CAN, GBR, NZL"—means that the information can be released to properly cleared personnel of the United States, Australia, Canada, Great Britain, and New Zealand.

The "ACCM" part of the Secret marking denotes material protected by "Alternative Compensatory Control Measures," according to another Defense Department manual. Those measures include a list of people authorized to access the information, the manual says. "Compromise of ACCM program information can present an immediate and real threat to national security and those personnel involved in mission execution," the manual says.

The report notes other indications that what was said at the event should be handled with care. The prepared remarks that Panetta delivered "were labeled SECRET//NOFORN"—meaning not releasable to foreign nationals—and a record of the event was made "accessible on the CIA's classified network," the report says.

The IG report does not say what Top Secret or Secret information Panetta provided. It rules out a broad category of sensitive Defense Department information: "tactics, techniques, and procedures," known as TTPs. The report's authors concluded that "no classified or sensitive special operations TTPs were exposed" at the event.

### "No Precautionary Measures"

The IG report says special operations personnel were not pleased to discover that an outsider was at the CIA event. At a reception following the ceremony, Admiral William H. McRaven, one of the raid's overseers, was introduced to a person "identified as the maker of the 'Hurt Locker," the draft report says. "ADM McRaven and DoD special operators present were all 'universally surprised and shocked' that a Hollywood executive attended this CIA Headquarters awards ceremony."

"ADM McRaven informed us he was concerned about the possible release of the special operators' identities," the draft report says.

As secrecy surrounding the raid eroded, in part through the appearance of a filmmaker at the CIA event, the military became increasingly concerned that participants in the raid could be targeted for terrorist retaliation. The report notes that McRaven held a meeting with families of special operators to tell them that "additional protective monitoring" would be provided and "to call security personnel if they sensed anything."

The probe by the Defense Department IG's office did not assess the extent of any compromise to CIA sources and methods or intelligence-gathering capabilities, the report says.

In the run-up to the event, the prospect of a Hollywood executive attending was a subject of concern within the CIA public affairs office, the report says.

The report says that a CIA public affairs officer tried to prevent the filmmaker from attending. That information is attributed to a Defense Department official who had been in contact with the CIA public affairs officer. However, the day of the event, the CIA public affairs officer allegedly relayed that efforts to keep the filmmaker out failed "and the 'Chief of Staff' directed that the Hollywood executive be given access to the event."

The report says Panetta's chief of staff at the CIA—Jeremy Bash, who followed him to the Defense Department in the same role—disputed that account, saying he was not involved.

Though special operations personnel expected it to be a small event, it was far from that, the report says. "The Director of CIA's Chief of Staff described it to us as 'a huge enormous crowd, I mean they built a tent and it was not sensitive, I would say it was not a highly sensitive event. It was pretty much a cattle call" but "not open to the public per se," the draft report says.

The special operators attended in uniform with their names displayed and were directed to reserved seats in the front row, the report says. The identities of the SEAL Team members could have been useful leads for anyone trying to gather information about the mission.

"We found no precautionary measures were taken to protect special operators from being identified by the Hollywood executive at this event," the draft report says.

Panetta: "No Unauthorized Disclosures"

The findings in the draft inspector general's report seem to be at odds with public statements Panetta has made.

Panetta told ABC in May 2012 that "nothing inappropriate" was shared with the filmmakers.

"We'll try to make sure that we give them accurate information so that the historic record is protected. But you. know, we do not share anything that is inappropriate with anybody," he said on "This Week."

At a June 13, 2012, Senate hearing, Panetta said:

"I also want to make clear that, you know, no unauthorized disclosures were provided to movie producers or anybody else. What we do have is we do have an office at the Pentagon that almost every day deals with people that want to do something about, you know, either a movie or a book or an article or something related to our defense.

"And we want to make sure that the information that they do use is accurate. And we do assist them with regards to the accuracy of that information. But I can assure you, I've asked that question, in this instance, nobody released any information that was unauthorized."

Panetta's alleged disclosures at the CIA event were not the only potential embarrassments for the Pentagon and the Obama Administration in the draft IG report.

The document says that Undersecretary of Defense for Intelligence Michael Vickers gave Boal and Bigelow the name of a Special Operations planner of the raid - an "Operator and Commander"—that was protected by law and was "For Official Use Only, not for public release,"

But, as with Panetta's alleged mention of the ground commander's name, the federal laws the report cites with respect to the undersecretary's disclosure are not specifically focused on covert operators. They deal with, among other things, "personally identifying information" about "any member of the armed forces assigned to an overseas unit, a sensitive unit, or a routinely deployable unit." The "For Official Use Only" label does not mean the information is classified.

The report obtained by POGO paints Panetta's disclosure in more serious terms. It flatly states that, percentived naming the ground commander at the June 2011 ceremony, he revealed information that was classifican RELEASE

### Santa Delayed

As recently as December 2012, after repeated delays, the IG's office was gearing up to release the Zero Dark Thirty report, POGO has been told.

In the December email chain with a congressional staff member, the IG employee who had been so critical of the IG's office expressed relief.

"Senior leadership met on Friday afternoon. Decided subject report you inquired on should be issued."

"Yes Virginia, there is a Santa Clause [sic]...DODIG does its mission."

As it turns out, that assessment was premature.

### **Unreleased: Probe Finds CIA Honcho Disclosed Top Secret Info to Hollywood**

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Topics: Government Accountability, National Security

The Defense Department Inspector General's office has been sitting on a report that former Defense Secretary Leon Panetta disclosed "TOP SECRET" information and other sensitive details two years ago at an event attended by a "Hollywood executive" working on the movie Zero Dark Thirty.

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"Director Panetta also provided DoD information, identified by relevant Original Classification Authorities as TOP SECRET//SI//REL TO USA, AUS, CAN, GBR, NZL, as well as, SECRET/ACCM," the report says.

Panetta was not interviewed for the report, the document says. POGO's repeated attempts to reach him or a spokesperson for him through the Panetta Institute for Public Policy, his base in California, were unsuccessful.

"The report is not yet completed," said Bridget Ann Serchak, a spokeswoman for the Inspector General's office. "Once it is released, if it is unclassified, it will be posted on our Listserv and in our newsletter as well as on our website."

### **Plugging Leaks**

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Another person with knowledge of the probe said the draft report obtained by POGO matched a copy that person examined in January, when it appeared to be all but ready for release. The IG's office had gone so far as to include an undated cover letter addressed to the House committee chairman who requested the investigation.

### Message From a Whistleblower

Appointed by President Obama, Panetta served as CIA director from 2009 to mid-2011 and as Defense secretary from mid-2011 until early this year.

The unknown fate of the IG report was the subject of a December 2012 email exchange—obtained by POGO—between a congressional staff member and an employee in the IG's office. The congressional aide mentions having heard that someone in the IG's office was "sitting on it until Secretary Panetta retires" and asks the IG employee for any information about it.

The IG employee replies: "That effort... has been controlled and manipulated since inception by the IG Front Office." The employee adds: "There is a version ready to hit the street, been long time ready to hit the street... but we will see if that happens anytime soon. Highly unusual tight controls and tactical involvement from senior leadership on this project."

The employee says the matter reflects broader problems within the IG's office.

"I have grave concerns that the message and findings are now controlled and subject to undue influence across the board at DoD IG. I have never experienced or seen so much influence or involvement by outsiders now in developing and issuing oversight reports."

The IG employee invokes whistleblower status.

"I consider this protected communications on alleged wrong-doings within the Government."

### Lame Duck Watchdogs

The story of the unreleased investigative report illustrates systemic problems that can undermine the independence of inspectors general, federal watchdogs meant to provide a check on executive branch departments and agencies. The Defense Department IG answers not only to Congress but also to the secretary.

Across various departments, <u>IG posts have gone unfilled for long periods of time</u>, left in the hands of officiáls serving on an interim basis. Less secure in their jobs, they may be in a weaker position to challenge authority.

As POGO said in testimony to Congress last year, "It is hard to imagine that an Acting IG known for conducting hard-hitting investigations and audits that implicate high-level administration officials would be asked by that same administration to serve as IG on a permanent basis APPROVED FOR

RELEASE DATE: 25-Nov-2013 The Defense Department IG's job has been vacant since December 2011, and the office has been headed on a temporary basis by Lynne M. Halbrooks, who is now the principal deputy inspector general. She has sought support to be named permanent inspector general, a presidential appointment that traditionally involves the approval of the secretary.

Serchak, the IG spokeswoman, said the absence of a permanent inspector general has not affected the office's work.

"Nothing's changed," she said,

In January, representatives of the IG's office told Senate overseers that the Zero Dark Thirty report would not be released until the office had completed two related reports, POGO has been told.

The IG report also highlights what critics have complained is inconsistent treatment of people who spill government secrets.

"It's like Animal Farm," said one person with knowledge of the investigation. "Some people are more equal than others."

In the realm of national security, the government has taken extraordinary steps to plug news leaks, prosecute whistleblowers, and probe news organizations. In contrast, the IG report describes how the Obama Administration threw its support behind a Hollywood project depicting one of President Obama's most dramatic triumphs – the nighttime SEAL team assault on the compound in Abbottabad, Pakistan where bin Laden – referred to as "UBL" – had been hiding.

After Panetta became secretary of Defense, senior Panetta aides implored a resistant Special Operations Command to assist, according to the draft IG report.

"Secretary Panetta wants the Department to cooperate fully with the makers of the UBL movie," a Pentagon under secretary emailed the head of Special Operations, according to the report.

Emailing a senior Pentagon colleague during the summer of 2011, Defense Department spokesman George Little offered a glimpse of Panetta's enthusiasm. "I hope they get Pacino to play [Secretary Panetta]," the report quotes Little as having written. "That's what he wants, no joke!"

# **Inside The CIA's Big Tent**

Zero Dark Thirty debuted in December 2012. At one time, it had been slated for release before last fall's election. The producers included Kathryn Bigelow, the Academy Award winning director of The Hurt Locker, about an Army bomb squad in Iraq, and Mark Boal, screenwriter of The Hurt Locker.

The IG report recounts that Boal was permitted to attend a June 24, 2011, ceremony at CIA headquarters honoring personnel involved in the May 2011 bin Laden raid. The fact that the screenwriter was allowed to attend has been reported previously and has been a subject of controversy. The IG report provides new details about the event—notably, that Panetta's remarks contained information classified as Secret and Top Secret.

The "SI" part of the Top Secret marking refers to Special Intelligence, another term for communications intelligence, according to a Defense Department classification manual. It applies to electronic intercepts, said Steven Aftergood of the Federation of American Scientists. The rest of the Top Secret marking – "REL TO USA, AUS, CAN, GBR, NZL"—means that the information can be released to properly cleared personnel of the United States, Australia, Canada, Great Britain, and New Zealand.

The "ACCM" part of the Secret marking denotes material protected by "Alternative Compensatory Control Measures," according to <u>another Defense Department manual</u>. Those measures include a list of people authorized to access the information, the manual says. "Compromise of ACCM program information can present an immediate and real threat to national security and those personnel involved in mission execution," the manual says.

The report notes other indications that what was said at the event should be handled with care. The prepared remarks that Panetta delivered "were labeled SECRET//NOFORN"—meaning not releasable to foreign nationals—and a record of the event was made "accessible on the CIA's classified network," the report says.

The IG report does not say what Top Secret or Secret information Panetta provided. It rules out a broad category of sensitive Defense Department information: "tactics, techniques, and procedures," known as TTPs. The report's authors concluded that "no classified or sensitive special operations TTPs were exposed" at the event.

# "No Precautionary Measures"

The IG report says special operations personnel were not pleased to discover that an outsider was at the CIA event. At a reception following the ceremony, Admiral William H. McRaven, one of the raid's overseers, was introduced to a person "identified as the maker of the 'Hurt Locker," the draft report says. "ADM McRaven and DoD special operators present were all 'universally surprised and shocked' that a Hollywood executive attended this CIA Headquarters awards ceremony."

"ADM McRaven informed us he was concerned about the possible release of the special operators' identities," the draft report says:

As secrecy surrounding the raid eroded, in part through the appearance of a filmmaker at the CIA event, the military became increasingly concerned that participants in the raid could be targeted for terrorist retaliation. The report notes that McRaven held a meeting with families of special operators to tell them that "additional protective monitoring" would be provided and "to call security personnel if they sensed anything."

The probe by the Defense Department IG's office did not assess the extent of any compromise to CIA sources and methods or intelligence-gathering capabilities, the report says.

In the run-up to the event, the prospect of a Hollywood executive attending was a subject of concern within the CIA public affairs office, the report says.

The report says that a CIA public affairs officer tried to prevent the filmmaker from attending.

That information is attributed to a Defense Department official who had been in contact with the CIA public affairs officer. However, the day of the event, the CIA public affairs officer RELEASE DATE: 25-Nov-2013

allegedly relayed that efforts to keep the filmmaker out failed "and the 'Chief of Staff' directed that the Hollywood executive be given access to the event."

The report says Panetta's chief of staff at the CIA-Jeremy Bash, who followed him to the Defense Department in the same role—disputed that account, saying he was not involved.

Though special operations personnel expected it to be a small event, it was far from that, the report says. "The Director of CIA's Chief of Staff described it to us as 'a huge enormous crowd, I mean they built a tent and it was not sensitive, I would say it was not a highly sensitive event. It was pretty much a cattle call" but "not open to the public per se," the draft report says.

The special operators attended in uniform with their names displayed and were directed to reserved seats in the front row, the report says. The identities of the SEAL Team members could have been useful leads for anyone trying to gather information about the mission.

"We found no precautionary measures were taken to protect special operators from being identified by the Hollywood executive at this event," the draft report says.

Panetta: "No Unauthorized Disclosures"

The findings in the draft inspector general's report seem to be at odds with <u>public statements</u> Panetta has made.

Panetta told ABC in May 2012 that "nothing inappropriate" was shared with the filmmakers.

"We'll try to make sure that we give them accurate information so that the historic record is protected. But you know, we do not share anything that is inappropriate with anybody," he said on "This Week."

At a June 13, 2012, Senate hearing, Panetta said:

"I also want to make clear that, you know, no unauthorized disclosures were provided to movie producers or anybody else. What we do have is we do have an office at the Pentagon that almost every day deals with people that want to do something about, you know, either a movie or a book or an-article or something related to our defense.

"And we want to make sure that the information that they do use is accurate. And we do assist them with regards to the accuracy of that information. But I can assure you, I've asked that question, in this instance, nobody released any information that was unauthorized."

Panetta's alleged disclosures at the CIA event were not the only potential embarrassments for the Pentagon and the Obama Administration in the draft IG report.

The document says that Undersecretary of Defense for Intelligence Michael Vickers gave Boal and Bigelow the name of a Special Operations planner of the raid – an "Operator and Commander"—that was protected by law and was "For Official Use Only, not for public release."

But, as with Panetta's alleged mention of the ground commander's name, the federal laws the OR RELEASE report cites with respect to the undersecretary's disclosure are not specifically focused on co

APPROVED

operators. They deal with, among other things, "personally identifying information" about "any member of the armed forces assigned to an overseas unit, a sensitive unit, or a routinely deployable unit." The "For Official Use Only" label does not mean the information is classified.

The report obtained by POGO paints Panetta's disclosure in more serious terms. It flatly states that, beyond naming the ground commander at the June 2011 ceremony, he revealed information that was classified.

# Santa Delayed

As recently as December 2012, after repeated delays, the IG's office was gearing up to release the Zero Dark Thirty report, POGO has been told.

In the December email chain with a congressional staff member, the IG employee who had been so critical of the IG's office expressed relief.

"Senior leadership met on Friday afternoon. Decided subject report you inquired on should be issued."

"Yes Virginia, there is a Santa Clause [sic]...DODIG does its mission."

As it turns out, that assessment was premature.

Former CIA Director Leon Panetta revealed the name of the Navy SEAL unit that carried out the Osama bin Laden raid and named the unit's ground commander at a 2011 ceremony attended by "Zero Dark Thirty" filmmaker Mark Boal, according to a draft Pentagon inspector general's report obtained by a watchdog group.

Panetta also disclosed classified information designated as "top secret" and "secret" during his presentation at the CIA awards ceremony, says the draft IG report published Wednesday by the Project on Government Oversight.

The report does not make clear whether Panetta was aware that Boal was present at the

ceremony, held under a tent at the CIA complex on June 24, 2011. "Approximately 1,300" people from the military and the intelligence community were on hand for the event, according to a CIA press release issued the following week.

The disclosure of the IG report could complicate the Obama administration's claims that senior officials have not leaked classified information. Last spring, Republicans publicly attacked President Barack Obama and his top aides, alleging that the administration leaked national security secrets to burnish Obama's standing for his reelection bid.

The release of the findings in the draft report also raises questions about why the findings have been under wraps for so long and which of the document's conclusions were known to White House officials prior to last November's election.

Rep. Peter King (R-N.Y.), who requested the inspector general's review, said he was disturbed by the report's findings and by the delays in its official release.

"It does raise issues about a lack of security at the CIA and at DoD," King told POLITICO on Wednesday. "The most important issue right now is why this report was held back for so long. Inspectors general are supposed to be independent. It's the integrity of the process. ... It's important to know where that pressure [to withhold it] was coming from."

King said he still had no official notification about the report but heard that it had been completed some time ago. "I've been hearing at least since January that this report was final and that it could affect some high-ranking people, some high-ranking officials," he said.

A spokeswoman for the inspector general's office did not provide a reason for the delay. "While we do not have a projected date of completion for the referenced report, we are working diligently to complete the project as quickly as possible," she told POLITICO. She added that general practice is to note soon-to-be released reports in the department's newsletter, and include unclassified reports in the newsletter and on the website and listserv after they have been released.

DoD has been without a confirmed inspector general since December 2011.

A source told POLITICO last July that the DoD IG review was essentially complete and that that the findings could be politically significant, though an IG spokeswoman said at the time that "no release date has yet been determined."

In December, the spokeswoman told POLITICO: "The assessment report our staff is preparing in response to the congressional request from Rep. King has not yet been completed, so there is no update at this time."

(S) Executive Summary: In accordance with your direction in the cited reference memorandum, the Office of Security (OS) has undertaken an internal review of filmmaker Mark Boal's attendance at the classified Bin Ladin Operation Award Ceremony held on 24 June 2011 on the CIA Compound. The review revealed that access to the Agency was performed in accordance with policy; however, attendance at the ceremony was not in accordance with policy for uncleared visitors. Details of the review are provided in this memorandum.

## Timeline of Interaction with Bin Ladin Film

April 2010 – D/CIA Panetta and film director Kathryn Bigelow meet at an event where she discusses her film project; DCIA offers Agency assistance.

**Early Spring 2011 (in March or April, before the raid)** – Michael Feldman, the film's public relations representative, contacted DCIA's Chief of Staff, Jeremy Bash, to renew the request for assistance.

Early May 2011 - Feldman again reaches out to Bash, who refers him to Office of Public Affairs.

10 May 2011 — Director OPA receives a letter from the filmmakers requesting a phone call to discuss the movie project.

17 May 2011 – Conference call between Office of Public Affairs officers, the film's screenwriter, Mark Boal, and Bigelow.

20 May 2011 - Meeting between Feldman, Boal, Director of the Office of Public Affairs, and Bash.

Week of 6 June 2011 – Meetings between Boal, Bash, DD/CIA, and officers involved in the hunt for Bin Ladin.

26 October, 1 November, 18 November, 5 December 2011—Boal reads his script over the telephone to OPA officers so that OPA could determine if the script inadvertently exposed any sensitivities.
<b>4 January 2012</b> – Telephone conversation with Boal in which he asks about the possibility of filming at the Agency.
10 February 2012 – OPA meets with DDCIA, ADDCIA, and DDCIA Chief of Staff to discuss filmmakers' request to film on the Agency compound.
16 February 2012 – from the Virginia Film Office, and Colleen Gibbons, the film's location manager, tour Agency and meet with Public Affairs officers.
17 February 2012 - DDCIA concurs in principle (with DCIA concurrence) with allowing UBL filmmakers to film under the same strict parameters used with other productions.
21 February 2012 – OPA informs filmmakers that their request to film has been approved, in the same locations and under the same conditions as previous films.
9 April 2012 – OPA officers—including an authorized Agency photographer—escort Gibbons to location in Headquarters where filming has previously been allowed (the OHB lobby, upper OHB lobby, Director' Gallery, etc) and take unclassified photos. Photos are reviewed by security and subsequently passed to Gibbons the next week.
17 April 2012 – Glbbons and OPA officers meet with security to begin discussions about logistics of filming.

## Referral Synopsis

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Potential Unauthorized Disclosure of Classified and/or National Defense Information to Individuals not possessing Security Clearances

### Summary

(U//FOUO) A review conducted by the Intelligence and Special Program Assessments (ISPA) Directorate, Department of Defense (DoD), Office of Inspector General (OIG), revealed that while Director of the Central Intelligence Agency, Leon E. Panetta, may have provided classified information to individuals who do not possess a security clearance and may have provided DoD sensitive program information to personnel no briefed onto DoD classified programs.

### Background

(U) Representative Peter T. King, U.S. House of Representatives, Chairman, Committee on Homeland Security, expressed concerns regarding ongoing leaks of classified information involving sensitive military operations via a letter dated August 9, 2011, addressed to DoD IG and the Central Intelligence Agency's (CIA) IG. Representative King noted that the New York Times had recently reported that:

Administration officials may have provided filmmakers with details of the raid that successfully killed Usama bin Laden (UBL). According to that report, Sony Pictures Entertainment, Inc. and movie director Kathryn Bigelow received "top-level access to the most classified mission in history" to produce a movie about the raid, due for release in October 2012. Reportedly, a Hollywood filmmaker also attended a CIA ceremony in honor of the team that carried out the raid.

(U) Representative King requested "an investigation and classified briefing regarding this matter from the Defense Department's and CIA's Inspectors General."

## Timeline

(U) On December 10, 2011, DoD IG announced that ISPA planned to initiate a related project. ISPA agreed to assess whether DoD equities were compromised as a result of cooperation afforded to filmmakers.

(U//FOUO) In conjunction with the review, ISPA requested data from the Office of the Under Secretary of Defense for Intelligence (OUSD(I)), the Office of the Under Secretary of Defense for Policy (OUSD(P)), the Joint Staff (JS), the United States Special Operations Command (USSOCOM), the Office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Public Affairs (OASD(PA)), and DoD's Washington Headquarters Services. ISPA also interviewed personnel from each of the aforementioned DoD components.

(U//FOUO) The DoD OIG met with personnel from the CIA OIG on Friday, May 11, 2012 to discuss this project. During this meeting, a video currently maintained on CIA's

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classified network of a June 24, 2011 awards ceremony was viewed. During this ceremony the DoD OIG personnel identified possible DoD equities and requested a copy of the video. In early June 2012 the CIA OIG obtained authorization to provide a copy of this video to the DoD OIG.

(U//FOUO) The DoD OIG subsequently transcribed the speech given by then Director of the CIA, the Leon E. Panetta. The DoD OIG sent this transcription to relevant Original Classification Authorities (OCAs) for classification determination to identify the following:

- 1. Classification determination of the transcript at the time of the incident (June 24, 2011), to include the rationale for that determination with citation to the specific elements within the security classification guide.
- Classification determination of the transcript currently, to include the rationale for that determination with citation to the specific elements within the security classification guide.
- 3. If the information in the transcript has been declassified at some point the date of declassification, the rationale for that declassification with citation to the specific elements within the security classification guide, name and title of person who made the declassification determination, citation to the individual's authority to make that determination, and copy of the document memorializing that declassification determination.

## Initial Classification Determination of OCAs

(U//FOUO) On July 13, 2012, ISPA sent a request to the National Security Agency (NSA) and to Joint Staff (JS) for an OCA determination of the remarks made by Dir. Panetta at the UBL Operation Award Ceremony on June 24, 2011.

ISPA discovered proof of inconsistencies and lack of information on the original transcript received by CIA in comparison to the video recording. As a result of the inaccurate transcript, OGC

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determined the OCAs determination are not invalid and must been resubmitted for another OCA determination to include the verbatim information.

(U//FOUO) On August 27, 2012, ISPA submitted another OCA determination request to NSA and JS to review the verbatim transcript and determine if the original OCA determination is still valid or has changed.

(U//FOUO) On September 10, 2012, JS has determined that the original OCA determination is still and continues to be valid. The remarks made by Dir. Panetta at the UBL Operation Award Ceremony on June 24, 2011, were determined to contain JS information classified TOP SECRET//

I write to express concern regarding engoing leaks of classified information regarding sensitive military operations. As reported in a New York Times column on August 6, 2011, Administration officials may have provided filmmakers with details of the raid that successfully killed Usama bin Laden (UBL). According to that report, Sony Pictures Entertainment, Inc. and movie director Kathryn Bigelow received "top-level access to the most classified mission in history" to produce a movie about the raid, due for release in October 2012. Reportedly, a Hollywood filmmaker also attended a CIA ceremony in honor of the team that carried out the raid.

The Administration's first duty in declassifying material is to provide full reporting to Congress and the American people, in an effort to build public trust through transparency of government. In contrast, this alleged collaboration belies a desire of transparency in favor of a cinematographic view of history.

Special Operations Command's Admiral Eric Olson stated that the May 1st raid "was successful because nobody talked about it before, and if we want to preserve this capability nobody better talk about it after," and that his operators "15 minutes of fame lasted about 14 minutes too long. They want to get back is the shadows," Joint Chiefs of Staff Chairman Admiral Michael Mullen stated that "It is time to stop talking," as "We have gotten to a point where we are close to jeopardizing the precision capability that we have, and we can't afford to do that. This fight isn't over." Furmer Defense Secretary Robert Gales stated that "Too many people in too many places are talking too much about this operation, and when so much detail is available it makes that both more difficult and riskier" for such missions in the future.

Leaks of classified information regarding the bin Laden raid have already resulted, according to a June 15, 2011 article in the Washington Post, in the arrests of Pakistanis who were believed by local authorities to have assisted the CIA with the May 1<sup>st</sup> raid. Further participation by JSOC and the Agency in making a film about the raid is bound to increase such leaks, and undermine these organizations' hard-won reputations as "quiet professionals" — reputations important for their continued operational success. And, the success of these organizations is vital to our continued homeland security.

Therefore, I request an investigation and classified briefing regarding this matter from the Defense Department's and CIA's Inspectors General, including but not limited to the following:

- What consultations, if any, occurred between members of the Executive Office
  of the President, and Department of Defense and/or CIA officials, regarding the
  advisability of providing Hollywood executives with access to covert military
  operators and claudestine CIA officers to discuss the UBL raid?
- Will a copy of this film be submitted to the military and ClA for pre-publication review, to determine if special operations factice, techniques and procedures, or Agency intelligence sources and methods, would be revealed by its release?
- How was the attendance of filmmakers at a meeting with special operators and Agency officers at CIA Headquarters balanced against those officers' duties to maintain their covers? How will cover concerns be addressed going forward?
- What steps did the Administration take to ensure that no special operations tactica, techniques, and procedures were compromised during those meetings?
- To the extent possible to determine, how many human intelligence sources and how many Agency intelligence methods have been compromised due to leaks about the May I<sup>st</sup> raid? What effects have these compromises had on the CIA's collection capabilities? Will Agency participation in a film about the bin Laden raid add to or exacerbate the effects of these compromises?

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#### Meetings with UBL Movie Screenwriter and Director

CIA's cooperation with the UBL movie began over a year ago when D/CIA Leon Panetta and Director Kathryn Bigelow met at an event and she discussed her planned movie. At that time, D/CIA offered assistance. In March or April 2011, Michael Feldman (who handles the PR for the movie) contacted Jeremy Bash to ask for cooperation on the film. After 1 May, Feldman reached out again to Jeremy Bash, who directed Feldman to call George Little in OPA. He sent a letter to George Little in mid-May officially requesting CIA assistance.

CIA officers met with Director Kathryn Bigelow and Screenwriter Mark Boal with the approval of D/CIA Panetta. ADCIA Morell continued to approve the meetings after D/CIA's departure, instructing that officers were only to talk about what we know, not about how we knew it. At no time were there discussions between the CIA and the White House regarding a CIA's decision to provide support to Bigelow and Boal.



#### Dear Deputy Director Morell:

I am writing regarding the Committee on Homeland Security's ongoing investigation into the possible release of classified information to filmmakers regarding the raid, which killed al-Qaeda leader Osama bin Laden. As you may know, this matter is currently under investigation by the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) Office of the Inspector General.

On May 22, in response to a Freedom of Information Act (FOIA), a Federal judge ordered the release of electronic communications regarding the CIA's cooperation on the bin Laden movie. In my view, these emails raise serious questions regarding your central role in providing classified and sensitive information to individuals without appropriate security clearances while Acting Director of Central Intelligence in 2011.

According to the documents, filmmakers Mark Boal and Kathryn Bigelow obtained the Agency's permission for at least six visits to CIA facilities. These facilities included secure vaults within the Counterterrorism Center (CTC) and may have also included a sensitive, covered facility located away from CIA headquarters.<sup>2</sup> During these visits, the filmmakers met with a number of CIA officials, including yourself (twice). They also met with an unknown number of National Clandestine Service (NCS) officers, including at least one who participated in the Abbottabad raid.

On at least one of these visits, the filmmakers were accompanied by Michael Feldman, a Founding Partner and Managing Director of The Glover Park Group, a leading communications and lobbying firm. Based on the documents, The Glover Park Group appears to have been retained by the filmmakers to gain unprecedented access to CIA and special operations personnel.

See November 9, 2011 correspondence from CIA's Office of Inspector General (OIG), stating that the Agency's "Office of Public Affairs is developing a written policy to create a single point of reference that will govern future interactions with the entertainment industry," and that OIG "will review the established guidelines once the policy is completed."

According to other released documents, Marie Harf from the CIA Office of Public Affairs facilitated most of these meetings. As you know, Ms. Harf has since departed the CIA to take a position at President Obama's reelection campaign headquarters in Chicago. In several emails to CIA personnel, including National Clandestine Service officers, Ms. Harf stated:

- "[Filmmaker Mark Boal] has met with a number of your colleagues in CTC and throughout the Agency. One of those folks he's chatted with is [redacted] who recommended you as someone else who might want to sit down with Mark ... he's spoken to a number of folks who worked on the operation from [HQS], and to your predecessor [redacted] but he's looking for more color about what it was like to be working this from the field ... Don't hesitate to let me know if you have any questions! It's totally up to you whether or not you want to participate. I know this isn't the typical CIA experience [smile emotion]"
- Bigelow and Boal are described as "visitors sanctioned by ODCIA," the Office of the Director of CIA.
- "As a [sic] Agency, we've been pretty forward-leaning with Boal."
- "We think it would make sense, if you're willing to do so, if you would sit down and chat with Boal as well ... I know this is a little outside what we typically do as CIA officers ... we're trying to keep his visits at [HQS] a bit quiet, because of the sensitivities surrounding who gets to participate in these types of things. I'm sure you understand ..."

Pursuant to Rule X, Clauses 2(a) and 3(g)(1), and Rule XI, Clause 1(b)(1) of the House of Representatives, I request answers to the following questions no later than May 29, 2012:

- 1. Is it CIA practice to meet with registered lobbyists in order to facilitate access to National Clandestine Service personnel? How many meetings with registered lobbyists have been held at CIA Headquarters since January 20, 2009?
- 2. How many National Clandestine Service officers were made available to the filmmakers?
- 3. Were National Clandestine Service officers pressured to meet with the filmmakers?
- 4. Were National Clandestine Service officers introduced to Boal and Bigelow over the objections of the Director of the CTC, who apparently declined to meet with the filmmakers?
- 5. Did representatives of CIA's Office of Security and/or Counterintelligence Center accompany the filmmakers on their visits to CIA to ensure that CIA officials did not reveal classified information to them? If not, were representatives from the Office of Public Affairs their only escort?

- 6. For what purpose were the filmmakers taken into CIA vaults? Were they taken to a covered facility away from CIA's Headquarters campus? If so, why?
- 7. Film producer Mr. Boal stated to Under Secretary of Defense for Intelligence Michael Vickers the CIA told him about National Security Agency (NSA) and National Geospatial Intelligence Agency (NGA) involvement in obtaining intelligence for the Abbottabad raid. What exactly did CIA tell Boal about NSA and NGA involvement in the bin Laden operation? What role did NSA and NGA have in providing this information?

Following the operation that killed Osama bin Laden, multiple senior U.S. government officials expressed the importance of keeping information secret. According to public statements by former United States Special Operations Command Commander Admiral Eric Olson, former Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff Admiral Michael Mullen, and former Secretary of Defense Robert Gates, leaks pertaining to the raid jeopardize the capabilities of Special Operations Forces to kill terrorist leaders who threaten the U.S. Homeland and risk the safety of special operators and their families. It is unfortunate that the Administration's desire to provide Hollywood filmmakers access to such information is directly in opposition to the stated views of our senior military leadership.

Thank you for your prompt and personal attention to this serious matter of national security.

Dear Mr. Chairman:

I am writing in response to the 23 May 2012 letter from Chairman Peter King of the House Committee on Homeland Security regarding CIA's interaction with the producers of the film on the death of Usama Bin Ladin.

Let me first underscore that as an Agency, we endeavor to protect national security at all times. In CIA's interactions with the Bin Ladin filmmakers Mark Boal and Kathryn Bigelow, as in our interactions with the media in general, protection of national security information and equities is paramount. In the aftermath of the Bin Ladin raid, CIA was approached by a wide variety of reporters, authors, and filmmakers looking to tell the story of this major intelligence achievement. Then-DCIA Leon Panetta decided that the Agency should engage these efforts to ensure an appropriate portrayal of the Agency's mission as well as the dedication of the men and women of the CIA who played a key part in the success of that mission. But, in implementing this decision, he and I made clear to our staff that the protection of classified information would remain our first priority.

In the two decades or so that CIA has worked with film industry representatives, we have learned that major projects of any kind require multiple visits and meetings. These meetings include, without exception, a member of our public affairs staff, who is present to ensure that intelligence equities are protected. This policy was adhered to in the case of the Boal/Bigelow film project. In addition, the filmmakers offered to have CIA review the film's script to ensure that it did not

inadvertently compromise intelligence equities. CIA did so, and we found no classified information in the script.

Allow me now to respond to Chairman King's specific questions related to CIA's interaction with the Bin Ladin film.

1. Is it CIA practice to meet with registered lobbyists in order to facilitate access to National Clandestine Service ("NCS") personnel? How many meetings with registered lobbyists have been held at CIA Headquarters since January 20, 2009?

Answer: It is not CIA practice to meet with registered lobbyists in order to facilitate access to any of our personnel. Because our system for tracking access granted into CIA facilities does not track occupations, I cannot tell you how many meetings with registered lobbyists there have been since 20 January 2009. I can tell you, however, that access to CIA facilities is not granted without a sound justification related to CIA's mission.

With regard to the role played by Mr. Feldman, he attended the initial meeting at CIA but he did not facilitate the access of Mr. Boal and Ms. Bigelow to CIA or play a role in their subsequent visits to CIA. Let me emphasize that our interaction with Mr. Feldman at that first meeting was solely in his capacity as the film's public relations representative.

2. How many National Clandestine Service officers were made available to the filmmakers?

Answer: The filmmakers met with eight officers from the NCS and three officers from the Directorate of Intelligence, all of whom were introduced using first name only, and no recordings were permitted. These meetings occurred in June and July of 2011.

3. Were National Clandestine Service officers pressured to meet with the filmmakers?

Answer: All meetings between CIA officers and members of the entertainment industry are voluntary, and this was true in the case of the meetings with Mr. Boal and Ms. Bigelow.

4. Were National Clandestine Service officers introduced to Boal and Bigelow over the objections of the Director of the CTC, who apparently declined to meet with the filmmakers?

Answer: No. The Director of CTC did not object to meetings between National Clandestine Service officers and the filmmakers, and he met with the filmmakers himself.

5. Did representatives of CIA's Office of Security and/or Counterintelligence Center accompany the filmmakers on their visits to CIA to ensure that CIA officials did not reveal classified information to them? If not, were representatives from the Office of Public Affairs their only escort?

Answer: The CIA's practice for meetings with the media is to have at least one officer from the Office of Public Affairs (OPA) present, and in many cases a substantive manager as well, to ensure that any discussion remains focused on pre-authorized topics. This practice was adhered to in the case of the Bin Ladin film. I would note that in their interviews, the filmmakers inquired mostly about the officers' feelings and personal experiences as context for the development of the film's characters.

It is not CIA practice for officers from the Office of Security or the Counterintelligence Center to attend meetings with representatives of the media or entertainment industry.

6. For what purpose were the filmmakers taken into CIA vaults? Were they taken to a covered facility away from CIA's Headquarters campus? If so, why?

Answer: The filmmakers were taken into "vaults" on the CIA Headquarters compound only. "Vault" is a description that covers any secured space, meaning virtually every office and conference room in Headquarters. The filmmakers were escorted to these offices to give them a sense of the atmosphere and

working conditions at the Agency. In advance of these visits, the rooms were sanitized and any classified information was removed from view.

The filmmakers were not taken to a covert facility away from CIA's Headquarters campus. The specific "vault" referred to in the released emails is in a building next to CIA's New Headquarters Building, but one still on the Headquarters compound. This room is where the military planners worked; it allowed them to maintain a low profile while they planned the operation but kept them close to key Agency personnel. Any items or information in the room related to the planning were removed shortly after the mission. When the filmmakers saw the room, months later, it was unoccupied and empty.

7. Film producer Mr. Boal stated to Under Secretary of Defense for Intelligence Michael Vickers the CIA told him about National Security Agency (NSA) and National Geospatial Intelligence Agency (NGA) involvement in obtaining intelligence for the Abbottabad raid. What exactly did CIA tell Boal about NSA and NGA involvement in the Bin Laden operation? What role did NSA and NGA have in providing this information?

Answer: CIA's meetings with the filmmakers were guided by unclassified talking points that had been declassified for release the night of the raid by the DNI, briefed on background to the media the evening of the raid, and available on the internet. Those talking points highlighted that officers from CIA, NGA, and NSA worked "very hard as a team to analyze and pinpoint this compound. Together, they applied their unique expertise and capabilities to America's most vexing intelligence problem."

OPA used those talking points to brief the filmmakers on the intelligence case that led the USG to the Bin Ladin compound, and I too relied on them during my own two meetings with Mr. Boal and Ms. Bigelow. During these and other meetings with the filmmakers, CIA officers generally discussed the involvement of all three agencies, but did not get into specifics.

On one occasion, however, one of the filmmakers was exposed to a more specific breakdown of the responsibilities of the agencies and components involved in building the intelligence case and executing the raid. On 24 June 2011, Mr. Boal was permitted to attend the Bin Ladin Operation Award Ceremony at CIA Headquarters. Prior to the ceremony, Mr. Boal was advised by an OPA officer that he could absorb the emotion of the event as overall context for the film, but that he could not use in his script or any other published materials anything he heard at that ceremony. In the event's keynote speech, which was classified SECRET, then-DCIA Panetta gave credit to the efforts of each of the agencies and components that contributed to the operation, and he provided a thumbnail description of their roles.

OPA's review of the script for the film indicates that Mr. Boal has honored the restriction placed on him for the ceremony. Nonetheless, Director Petraeus and I believe that, however well intentioned the decision to allow him to witness the event may have been, Mr. Boal should not have been permitted to do so. Director Petraeus has directed that we undertake an internal examination of the decision to allow Mr. Boal to attend the event, with an eye toward improving, from the perspective of protecting classified information, the processes and procedures related to such media interactions.

A copy of this letter is being sent to Mr. Ruppersberger and the Chairman and Vice Chairman of the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence.

As always we thank you for your continued support of the Agency and the work that our officers do as the first line of our nation's defense.

Dear Inspectors General Heddell and Buckley:

I write to express concern regarding ongoing leaks of classified information regarding sensitive military operations. As reported in a New York Times column on August 6, 2011, Administration officials may have provided filmmakers with details of the raid that successfully killed Usama bin Laden (UBL). According to that report, Sony Pictures Entertainment, Inc. and movie director Kathryn Bigelow received "top-level access to the most classified mission in history" to produce a movie about the raid, due for release in October 2012. Reportedly, a Hollywood filmmaker also attended a CIA ceremony in honor of the team that carried out the raid.

The Administration's first duty in declassifying material is to provide full reporting to Congress and the American people, in an effort to build public trust through transparency of government. In contrast, this alleged collaboration belies a desire of transparency in favor of a cinematographic view of history.

Special Operations Command's Admiral Eric Olson stated that the May 1st raid "was successful because nobody talked about it before, and if we want to preserve this capability nobody better talk about it after," and that his operators' "15 minutes of fame lasted about 14 minutes too long. They want to get back in the shadows." Joint Chiefs of Staff Chairman Admiral Michael Mullen stated that "It is time to stop talking," as "We have gotten to a point where we are close to jeopardizing the precision capability that we have, and we can't afford to do that. This fight isn't over." Former Defense Secretary Robert Gates stated that "Too many people in too many places are talking too much about this operation, and when so much detail is available it makes that both more difficult and riskier" for such missions in the future.

Leaks of classified information regarding the bin Laden raid have already resulted, according to a June 15, 2011 article in the Washington Post, in the arrests of Pakistanis who were believed by local authorities to have assisted the CIA with the May I raid. Further participation by JSOC and the Agency in making a film about the raid is bound to increase such leaks, and undermine these organizations' hard-won reputations as "quiet professionals" — reputations important for their continued operational success. And, the success of these organizations is vital to our continued homeland security.

Therefore, I request an investigation and classified briefing regarding this matter from the Defense Department's and CIA's Inspectors General, including but not limited to the following:

- What consultations, if any, occurred between members of the Executive Office
  of the President, and Department of Defense and/or CIA officials, regarding the
  advisability of providing Hollywood executives with access to covert military
  operators and clandestine CIA officers to discuss the UBL raid?
- Will a copy of this film be submitted to the military and CIA for pre-publication review, to determine if special operations tactics, techniques and procedures, or Agency intelligence sources and methods, would be revealed by its release?
- How was the attendance of filmmakers at a meeting with special operators and Agency officers at CIA Headquarters balanced against those officers' duties to maintain their covers? How will cover concerns be addressed going forward?
- What steps did the Administration take to ensure that no special operations tactics, techniques, and procedures were compromised during those meetings?
- To the extent possible to determine, how many human intelligence sources and how many Agency intelligence methods have been compromised due to leaks about the May 1st raid? What effects have these compromises had on the CIA's collection capabilities? Will Agency participation in a film about the bin Laden raid add to or exacerbate the effects of these compromises?
